The textbook for the course is *Calculus, Early Transcendentals Version, 6<sup>th</sup>* ed., by Edwards and Penney.

Homework: This is by far the most important part of the course. There is no way to learn Calculus without doing lots of homework problems. The math department is transitioning to online homework using WebWorks. It is a pretty easy system to get used to, and it offers the advantage of immediate feedback on homework. I will e-mail everyone with instructions on how to get started a few days after classes start.

Grading: There will be 3 midterm exams. They are scheduled for February 9, March 9, and April 13. The final exam is on May 2 from 8:00–11:00am in our usual classroom. No make-up exams will be given. The final exam will be cumulative and will be worth two midterms. In addition the homework grade will count as one midterm.
